Light

Pruning

Like any plant, air plants should be pruned from time to time. If your plant has brown tips, you can carefully snip them off with sharp scissors. Also, after blooming, you can snip off the bloom to promote pup formation.

Removing Pups

After your plant flowers, it will eventually produce pups. You can remove them when they are 1/3 the size of the mother plant. To remove, gently twist them off of the base of the mother plant.

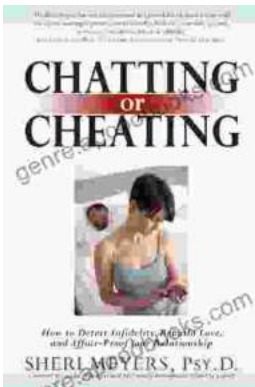
